From the Mayor's Desk...

'Tis the season that we are working on the municipal budget for 2008. It is my goal to keep our tax levy flat for the 4th consecutive year. It looked bleak when we received notification of rejection from the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) for a \$150,000 grant to fund Phase II of the Clinton Knolls Improvement Project. However, I explained to NJDOT that the roads in this neighborhood have been worn prematurely due to overspill traffic from Route 78 and they reversed their decision to fund this project. Phase I will be complete this spring and Phase II will commence shortly thereafter.

NJDOT funded a traffic engineering study of the Old Highway 22 corridor in 2007. Councilwoman Laurie Insel, Police Chief Brett Matheis, Administrator Bob Cutter and I will be meeting with NJDOT and our planning and engineering officials in March to move forward on implementation of a beautification and pedestrian safety improvement project for this commercial area.

Helping to reduce our tax burden is of primary concern to our Council and me. Councilwoman Laurie Insel and I continue to seek and apply for grant funding to reduce our burden. Laurie is in the process of applying

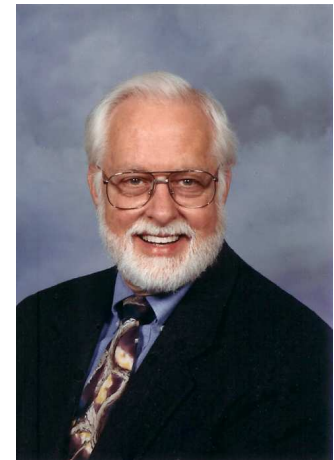
for a grant from Highlands for a planning grant and we will be applying to Highlands this spring for another grant to help fund our application to NJ's Council on Affordable Housing. Laurie is also working on another NJDOT grant to help fund the completion of the missing sidewalk on Union Road. In addition, we will be applying for a Small Cities grant to fund upgrades and rehabilitation at the Clinton Community Center.

The Town of Clinton saw approximately \$20,000 in tax savings in 2007 as a result of our expanded recycling program. Thank you for your participation! We replaced a gas guzzling Suburban with a Ford Escape Hybrid, changed cleaning chemicals to less expensive green products and reduced paper waste through increased use of email. I have been participating in Green seminars around the state to share our successes and learn about green programs in other municipalities. This year, we will conduct an energy audit and participate in a Natural Gas cooperative purchasing program. In addition, we are looking to use recycled ink cartridges and recycled paper in our office. We are looking for green products to replace the fertilizers and pesticides currently used on our grounds and fields. We will continue to replace Town vehicles with hybrids

when possible.

Congratulations to Jay Hunter who was recently promoted from Patrolman to Sergeant. Sergeant Hunter is a Marine who served several times in the Middle East earning two Purple Hearts and has served our Town well. We are honored to have him in Clinton.

The Mayor, Council and municipal staff deeply mourn the passing of Councilman John (Jack) Harrison on February 19, 2008.



Jack was a longtime Clinton resident; businessman and community volunteer serving over 20 years on our Board of Adjustment. Most recently Jack was appointed to Council in 2005, re-elected and sworn in to a new term on New Years Day. Jack faithfully served on several Committees' and was our Fire Commissioner. The Town of Clinton will continue to celebrate Jack through his many accomplishments in public and private life for many years to come.

Department of Fire Prevention by Jack Daniels



WHAT TYPE OF CHIMNEY DO YOU HAVE?

Your chimney is probably one of the components in your house that is most overlooked. This is unfortunate since it is the only path that the "bad" products from your fireplace or heating appliances travel out through. There are several important things that you should be aware of. This is not an inclusive list of the items of concern. You should consult with a professional chimney sweep or HVAC contractor for an inspection of your specific system. With that said, the following are the things that you as a homeowner or tenant should be aware of and check into.

1. When was the last time your chimney was inspected? It should be checked at least once a year. This is to verify that the chimney system is intact and there are no areas of leakage of the "bad" gases into your home or space.
2. If you have a fireplace, what type of wood product do you use? If the wax type logs are what you have used, please have your chimney

checked. These logs can leave an additional sticky substance on the inside of the chimney. Any unburned products may tend to stick to this and eventually build up a residue that could be easily ignited causing a chimney fire.

3. If you hire a professional to inspect your chimney (highly recommended) you should be certain that they are reputable and can provide you with references. Check out any company or contractor that you use to verify they are not only legitimate but that they are properly certified and/or licensed.
4. Any contractor that performs work on a residence must be licensed by the State of NJ Department of Consumer Affairs. The contractor must have a Homeowner Contractor Registration License number.
5. A construction permit is not required for an inspection of a chimney unless the inspection revealed that changes or repairs are needed in the chimney. Obtaining a construction permit is your only method to check the work done and verify that it is code compliant. Please note that if a fire were to occur, one of the things that insurance and

investigators check into is if there were construction permits taken out for any and all work done on the building.

6. If you have had a chimney fire, do not use the chimney any longer until it has been checked and inspected by a professional. Always obtain documentation regarding any such inspection of your chimney system.
7. Lastly, remember that any fuel burning appliance produces what is known as "products of combustion". These products contain carbon monoxide which is a colorless and odorless gas. In sufficient amounts over a period of time, it will kill you. The proper venting of your appliances is critical to allow the products of combustion to be discharged to the outside air. Install and check the operation of all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

With warmer weather comes increased pedestrian traffic throughout Clinton. It is extremely important that our pedestrians and motorists are aware of their separate but equal responsibilities at a crosswalk. Pedestrians must stop at the curb, look both ways and proceed only when safe to do so. Motorists must yield the right of way to a pedestrian who has entered the crosswalk. After dark, pedestrians should wear light or reflective clothing and motorists should pay extra attention at intersections and crosswalks for the unexpected. If either a pedestrian or motorist neglects their responsibilities at a crosswalk, the results can be tragic and expensive for both. The police department takes pedestrian safety very seriously and will be actively enforcing the law at our crosswalks.

HOUSE NUMBERS

Emergency responders frequently have difficulty responding to emergency calls at locations throughout Town because they are not properly marked with a street address that can readily be identified from the street or sidewalk. When an emergency happens seconds are critical to responding police, fire or rescue personnel. Please take the time to check your property to make sure that your house, apartment or building number is clearly marked and visible from the street so that those critical seconds can be spent on your emergency and not trying to find it!

OVERNIGHT PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Winter overnight parking restrictions end March 31st until next winter, yea!

CHILD SAFETY SEAT INSPECTIONS

Residents are encouraged to take advantage of our Child Safety Seat Inspection Program.

To have your child safety seat inspected contact our technician Patrolman Tim McGuire at 735-8611 and make an appointment for an inspection. These inspections take approximately one hour and there is no cost. Inspections are also available at the Hunterdon Medical Center by appointment.

CELL PHONES AND TEXT MESSAGING

In case you were not aware, on March 1st 2008 the use of a wireless HANDHELD telephone or electronic communication device and/or text messaging with such a device while driving becomes a PRIMARY traffic offense in New Jersey. In other words you are subject to be stopped and issued a summons just for talking on a handheld cellular phone or text messaging while operating a vehicle. Exceptions to this law are use of the device if the driver has reason to fear for his/her life or safety or to alert authorities to a fire, traffic accident, serious road hazard, medical emergency or another motorist who is operating in a reckless, careless or otherwise unsafe manner or who appears to be driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. SKATEBOARDS, SKATES, ROLLERBLADES and SCOOTERS

In addition to literally hundreds of complaints about their improper operation, we receive many inquiries every year regarding State law and our local ordinances governing skateboards, skates, scooters and other locomotion devices that are gas or electrically powered. Skateboards, skates and non-motorized scooters are considered "human powered" locomotion devices. They are prohibited from being operated on any street, highway or other area of Town designed for motor vehicles by ordinance. Additionally they are prohibited from being operated on the sidewalks of Main Street, Lower Cen-

ter Street, East Main Street and the section of Leigh Street from Route 173 to Center Street. Although they are sold in stores and on the internet, gas or electrically powered skateboards, scooters or any other "motorized" locomotion device are considered motor vehicles under current law and the operation of such powered devices is prohibited on any public street or sidewalk in New Jersey. Operation of these motorized devices on public streets can subject the operator to being charged under State motor vehicle law with operating an unregistered and uninsured vehicle in addition to any other traffic violation they may be committing, REGARDLESS OF AGE. If you have ANY questions regarding ANY motor vehicle law or Town ordinance regulating any of these devices PLEASE ASK an officer FIRST. Also, please remember that if you are under 18 years of age you MUST wear an approved helmet, even on a bicycle.

FINGERPRINTING

Fingerprinting has become required for a variety of public and private purposes. If you live in Clinton or the employer requiring you to be fingerprinted is in Clinton you can schedule an appointment to be fingerprinted by calling 908-735-2665 and leaving a message for Detective Sergeant Hunter.

Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad by Chad Newsome



2008 marks an important milestone for the Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad (CFARS). CFARS went into service on August 1, 1968 and, in that first year, answered 260 calls for emergency care. In 2007, the squad answered 2,141 calls. Our mission today remains the same: to provide the highest quality, rapid emergency medical care and rescue operations. CFARS' primary response area covers 48 square miles, including the Town of Clinton, a large portion of Clinton Township, and parts of Lebanon Borough, Franklin and Union Townships. CFARS provides 24/7 emergency medical services (EMS) duty coverage, averaging approximately five minute response times from our station to every scene.

Emergency medical services (EMS) in the U.S. can be traced back to the Civil War. In 1884, all personnel had to be examined by medical officers to qualify for duty. Also, ambulances were assigned based on the size of the regiment. Each ambulance team was trained in patient care to better take care of the soldiers. In 1865, Cincinnati incorporated the first civilian ambulance. Four years later, in 1869, New York advertised a 30-second response time and provided an ambulance surgeon and a quart of brandy for their patients.

During the World War I era, signal boxes were used by soldiers to help medical teams find them. Medical teams also used electric, steam and gasoline powered carriages for transporting the injured. It was also the first war in which traction splints and other medical equipment were readily available. After the war was over, civilian ambulances were equipped

with radio dispatchers to better serve the community and surgeons started to ride-along.

The transition to modern-day EMS started during the 1950s and went on to the 1960s. It started as an offshoot business of five different types of companies; towing operators, medical equipment businesses, funeral homes, hospitals, and police or fire agencies. In 1960, John F. Kennedy declared that, "Traffic accidents constitute one of the greatest, perhaps the greatest, of the nation's public health problems." Then in 1966, Lynden B. Johnson, using the President's Commission on Highway Safety/National Academy of Sciences, declared the carnage "the neglected disease of modern society." Also in 1966, the National Highway Traffic Safety Act was adopted. These events standardized EMS training, promoted state enrollment, encouraged community oversight, recommended radio communication and stressed a single emergency number.

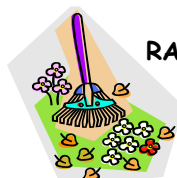
Other federal initiatives were put into effect that further helped define the EMS program, including the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (DHEW); the Physician Responder Program; and the EMS Systems Act. The DHEW established 300 EMS systems throughout the country. Then, the U.S. Department of Transportation adopted a training curriculum for EMT, EMT-Paramedic and first responder certification. Public Law 93-154 established new rules for EMS radio communications.

Today, EMS systems are one of the most important areas in the health

care field. The knowledge and services offered by EMS systems has benefits for individuals requiring comprehensive emergency medical care. Early research clearly established that EMS systems reduce preventable mortality and morbidity. Prevention activities also are having a positive effect, as evidenced by reductions in the number of motor vehicle fatalities over the last ten years. EMS systems continue to evolve, taking a more active role in prevention activities.

Today, CFARS is volunteer-run, utilizing a hybrid membership of volunteer and paid personnel. The hybrid system ensures in-house staffing and some of the fastest response times in the county. Unique in Hunterdon County, Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad has an ambulance crew in quarters, seven days a week. The squad operates five ambulances, a rescue truck, a marine support vehicle, two boats, a command vehicle and a technical rescue services trailer. In addition to our steadily increasing call volume, the squad donated countless hours in 2007 to educate more than 860 people within our community. From local school programs, to CPR training and merit badge programs, our PIER (Public Information and Educational Resource) Committee Chairman, Dominick Charowsky, led a dedicated team that volunteered additional duty to assist local groups. As one of the busiest EMS/Rescue agencies in Hunterdon County, residents and visitors alike can rest assured that when the need arises, our patients benefit from the strengths of our organization; our people, our leadership and our experience.

October 23, 2007

~Introduction of ordinance to remain with North Hunterdon Municipal Court with eight other municipalities.

~A resolution was made to hire Ann Marie Obiedzinski to be the Joint Tax Assessor for Township of Tewksbury and Town of Clinton.

November 27, 2007

Environmental Commission

Spring is just around the corner! As homeowners we have an urge to "feed" our lawns and gardens to get them healthy for the upcoming growing season. Stop right there! Step away from the fertilizer! When was the last time you had your soil tested?

Before you fertilize/lime your lawn and landscape plantings, take time to get a soil fertility test done. Why? It is essential to know the nutritional needs of your landscape prior to fertilization. What fertilizers does your lawn and landscape really need? Providing your lawn and landscape with the proper additives will help insure a healthy growing season. Proper

soil management will also reduce the potential for water contamination due to excess fertilizer run-off. Finally, knowing the nutritional needs of your landscape will save you money from purchasing unneeded fertilizers.

Soil testing is optimally done after the fall harvest or prior to spring fertilization. It is recommended that a soil test be performed every 2 - 3 years. The results of your test will typically include the availability of essential plant nutrients in your soil. The PH level, kits can be purchased directly from the Rutgers Cooperative Extension office of Hunterdon County, 6 Gaunt Place, Building #2 lower level (just north of Hunterdon Medical Center).
